The University of Manchester

The University of Manchester is one of the world's leading universities and a member of the UK's Russell Group of elite research universities. The University of Manchester is ranked as the world's 32nd best university in the QS World University Rankings, 6th in the UK, 8th in Europe, and is ranked number 2 in the world for the quality and scale of impact against the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) – the world's call to action on the most pressing challenges and opportunities facing humanity and the natural world. Manchester is among the largest single-site universities in the UK, with one of the biggest student communities - Manchester graduates continue to be in demand among leading employers.

The University is now well underway with one of the biggest investments in facilities undertaken by any UK university. This 10-year plan will transform the campus and create world-class facilities for staff, students and visitors in support of the University's global ambition. The three core goals are research and discovery, teaching and learning, and social responsibility, with people - staff and students - and values at the heart of the plan, which is underpinned by the themes of innovation, civic engagement, and global influence.

The University of Manchester is one of the UK's largest single-site universities with more than 48,000 students on campus – including more than 10,000 international students. The University is consistently ranked among the world's elite institutions for graduate employability and world-class research across a diverse range of fields including cancer, advanced materials, global inequalities, energy and industrial biotechnology. manchester.ac.ae 05

A rich heritage of ideas and innovation

The University of Manchester has a rich academic heritage, with 25 Nobel laureates among our current and former staff and students. Manchester was the birthplace of the nuclear age, with pioneering research leading to the splitting of the atom. The computer revolution started in Manchester when a machine known affectionately as 'The Baby', ran its first stored program. It was at the University that an economist and logician formulated the principles of modern economics, and it was at our Jodrell Bank site in Cheshire that the young physicist and radio astronomer built the world's largest steerable radio telescope. Great traditions have also flourished in theology, architecture, mathematics, music, law and many other areas. Many of our current academic staff are world-leaders in their fields.

The University of Manchester's position as a research powerhouse has been confirmed in the results of 2021 Research Excellence Framework (REF – the system for assessing research quality in UK institutions). Manchester retained fifth place for research power and overall, 93% of the University's research activity was assessed as 'world-leading' (4*) or 'internationally excellent' (3*). We are in the top three nationally for nine subjects.

Social responsibility underpins research activity at Manchester, and we combine expertise across disciplines to deliver pioneering solutions to the world's most urgent problems. We are ranked as one of the top ten universities in the world for delivering against the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (Times Higher Education Impact Rankings) and our research impact showcase includes examples of the positive impact we've made across culture and creativity, economic development and inequalities, health and wellbeing, innovation and commercialisation, and sustainability and climate change.

The REF exercise also evaluated the University's work to provide a creative, ambitious and supportive research environment, in which researchers at every career stage can develop and thrive as leaders in their chosen field. In this category, the University achieved a result of 99% 'internationally excellent' pr 'world-leading', making it one of the best places in the UK to build a research career.

As a transnational education provider, the University has a mission with a focus on three main elements – teaching, research and social responsibility.

The University aims to make a positive impact across all three elements wherever it works across the world, including in the UAE, where the decision to establish the Middle East Centre in Dubai was straightforward, given its regional business hub status.

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Manchester world class research with real-world impact

The University of Manchester is a powerhouse of research and is ranked among the leading research universities globally (top ten for social and environmental impact, Times Higher Education, 2023).

Research is at the heart of our heritage, our present and our vision for the future. Our discoveries have shaped the world today, from the development of the first stored-program computer to the establishment of modern economic theory. We bring the world's best people together, combining expertise from across disciplines to understand and find new solutions to some of the world's most pressing problems.

The University of Manchester retained 5th place for research power1 - the quality and scale of research and impact - in the UK government's Research Excellence Framework (REF) 2021, the major national exercise to evaluate research activity. Manchester made one of the largest and broadest REF submissions in the UK, entering 2,249 eligible researchers across 31 subject areas.

Overall, 93% of the University's research activity was assessed as 'world-leading' (4*) or 'internationally excellent'.

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Researchers from the University consistently make an important contribution to solving the world's most urgent problems, with the University ranking 2nd in the world for delivering against the UN Sustainable Development Goals in the Times Higher Education Impact Rankings.

Examples of this impact highlighted in the REF include improving cancer treatment, reducing carbon emissions from shipping and aviation and shaping international development policy to reduce poverty.

Many of these case studies provide examples of how The University of Manchester research has made a positive contribution to society, culture, public policy or services, health, the environment, quality of life and the economy – with benefits felt beyond academia.

The University of Manchester's research beacons are examples of pioneering discoveries, interdisciplinary collaboration and cross-sector partnerships that are tackling some of the biggest questions facing the planet.

The Middle East Centre Supporting working professionals

The University of Manchester has helped pioneer access to global business education in the Middle East with the introduction of the **Global Part-time MBA for working professionals**, bringing a top faculty–led MBA programme within easy, flexible and convenient reach for working professionals looking to accelerate their careers or become entrepreneurs, executives moving into new roles or international assignments, or working mothers transitioning back into the workplace, all supported by the dedicated team at the permanent regional centre.

The key milestone for the Centre was in 2017, when it was renamed The University of Manchester Middle East Centre (for the first 10 years, the centre was part of Alliance Manchester Business School). The change reflected the growing significance and opportunities of the region for the University and reaffirmed the decision to establish the centre in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, as it transformed into a world class regional and international hub for business and finance.



Today, The Middle East Centre represents the University's entire range of activities in the region and manages a dynamic portfolio of faculty–led, part–time flexible learning master's programmes for working professionals and short business courses for executives.


This currently comprises of:

- Three MBA options:
- Global Part–time MBA,
- Manchester Global Finance Accelerated MBA
- Global Executive MBA
- MA Educational Leadership in Practice
- MSc Financial Management
- Executive Education

All these learning experiences include a significant amount of time in face to face workshops or course conferences, all led by faculty. Many of the higher education programmes now offered in the UAE are more closely linked to the potential career opportunities in the country and region, as the regional economy undergoes rapid transformation.

The Middle East Centre has also run several open Executive Education management programmes for qualified professionals in the region, and also conducted the first research in the GCC market for executive education, together with Dubai International Academic City. The Centre continues to monitor/assess the region for future opportunities and demand for short executive education programmes, with the support of the campus-based team and also in discussion with corporate partners.

The Centre has supported around 3,400 part-time students based in the region and has graduated close to 2,300 MBA students since opening in 2006 and supports a regional community of around 5,000 alumni – all current and former students. The Centre enrolls around 200 new students each year across all its programmes – of which approximately 30% or more are female executives and 50% of all students reside in the UAE.



Today, the Middle East Centre is an acknowledged UK higher education success story in the region and actively engages its part-time master's students and alumni, through an intense networking outreach and social programme. The regional team has ensured the continuity of study and learning experience, growing online engagement with the regional community of students and alumni, introducing students to 'hybrid workshops' – a Middle East innovation – and even growing the programme portfolio while still continuing to support social causes.





Faculty-led flexible learning

Our faculty-led programmes bring our top academics to the region, as they lead the regular face to face student workshops hosted in Dubai, giving part-time students the same access to high quality faculty as on campus. Academics speak very highly of the quality and diversity of students supported at the Middle East Centre. In fact, many students from other centres within the University's network also choose to attend workshops in Dubai, because of the opportunity to network with our regional students and to explore the attractions and opportunities of this dynamic, world class smart city, the UAE and region.

Learning experience for the real world


The faculty-led academic programme brings its own opportunities and demands but the flexible learning format ensures a high degree of face-to-face contact not only with faculty but also with fellow students. When you consider that on average, half of the Global Part-time MBA students in the Middle East bring 20 years (or more) of work experience to the cohort from a range of industries (from construction to ICT to banking & Finance and consulting) and experience of working across the region, then the real impact of group projects and workshops becomes very clear. Many of the students are already in senior roles, or starting their own companies, and already hold a master's degree. Students from the Middle East are also strong academic performers – almost 61% of graduates are awarded the Manchester MBA with distinction or merit.



Counselling

Personal support for the learning journey

The Middle East Centre team of student advisors (every new student is assigned a personal advisor) ensures that every student has access to pre-programme materials designed to help overcome any concerns so students can make a fast and confident start to their part-time master's programme. Advisors support students throughout their learning journey and ensure students stay on track for success and are also there to advise when life and work may become a barrier to studying. These team members are highly experienced counsellors who have helped guide students through every personal and professional life- changing event imaginable, helped by the flexible nature of the learning format.



Preparing working professionals for the classroom

The University of Manchester has pioneered business education in the Middle East all supported by the team at the permanent regional centre. Every one of these students has an inspiring personal story to tell and many of these stories are about transformation and this is important – a part-time master's is a life and career changing experience. It's also a demanding and rigorous academic programme and it is important to help busy working professionals who may be coming back to the classroom after a break of many years to prepare. The Middle East Centre runs preparation courses to help new students adjust and make a strong and confident start to their learning journey.

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Career planning for success

All part-time master's students automatically join the regional alumni groups and enjoy access to the regional and global alumni community, with all the networking and other opportunities that come with it. The Middle East Centre also provides career services for students and alumni and these focus on career planning, job search and personal branding and presentation skills.

The Centre's team of qualified coaches is also supplemented by the Careers Consultants at Alliance Manchester Business School on campus in Manchester who also visit the region to host events in person or online. These valuable services help students and alumni to define the personal value proposition both for the external job market and also for internal promotion opportunities within the current employer organisation.

The sessions are designed to help clarify career ambitions, and how to identify and target potential new opportunities, providing insights and tips on how to develop job search / career planning strategies through networking (amongst other techniques) that can then be proactively implemented with success. The team has been involved in managing careers activities and working closely with students and alumni to ensure they are able to get the best out of their careers and and maximise potential job search and career planning opportunities during their studies.





Careers services

Dedicated careers support is an important part of ongoing alumni engagement and includes opportunities for group and 1-2-1 sessions focusing on areas such as career planning, CV writing and interview preparation, and online professional networking including personal branding. The team also organises regular careers events such as the Annual Women In Business Forum, which brings together senior female executives (including students and alumni) to share workplace experiences and insights and to enjoy the networking opportunities. There are also opportunities to meet the University's corporate partners at events such as The Annual Career Networking Event and attend briefings on various industries, such as professional services and consulting, helping alumni connect with potential employers.

Alumni relations

The campus–based Alumni Relations team is dedicated to developing and implementing relations activity across the alumni network of over 60,000 individuals across 176 countries – high performing individuals all around the world, including the Middle East. Alumni engagement takes a variety of forms and in the Middle East, country-based alumni groups across the region maintain local networking with the help and support of the Middle East Centre in Dubai. The Centre also manages an extensive outreach and engagement programme of faculty–led masterclasses, careers and other events and social networking opportunities for the 5,000 alumni based in the region.

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Lifelong relationships

Our aim is to support the community and provide a very rich and rewarding learning experience for students, and lifelong relationships with graduates. Learning is also a social and bonding experience, and many students and alumni are lifelong friends of the Centre and University. Many of our earliest students are still closely connected to the University in the region and some have gone on to become Ambassadors, Adjunct Faculty and Teaching Assistants on the Global Part–time MBA, reflecting the quality of our students and the progress they have made since graduating. It's very gratifying that today, many of our new students join us following a referral or recommendation from an alumnus. At Manchester we're proud to have the largest alumni community of any campus- based university in the UK, with more than 500,000 graduates in more than 190 countries around the world.

Partnering for success

The Middle East Centre has consistently focused on partnerships in the region and established a network of collaborations across the region through Strategic Talent Partnerships with local and international companies (such as Dubai Islamic, Saja Pharmaceuticals, General Motors) and professional bodies, including accountancy bodies, Chartered Institute of Marketing, Chartered Institute of Professional Development, and high profile local organisations such as Dubai Women Business Council, and Dubai Police. All the partnerships help enrich the learning experience for students and help create networking, career and other opportunities for alumni.

The Centre has also worked in collaborations with government and other organisations on projects ranging from the 'Manchester Innovation Award for Emiratis', to research into the opportunities for regional executive education, research into perceptions of creativity and innovation in Dubai Government, and a Covid–19 Recovery Report on the UAE produced in collaboration with Oxford Business Group.



Socially responsible

The Centre actively supports the University's three pillars of learning, research and social responsibility and for the Middle East Centre's 15th anniversary, the team developed a range of 15 social responsibility activities, including support for the Dubai Cares' 'Adopt a School' initiative to build a school in Nepal to provide children with access to education where they can learn and flourish. The University of Manchester Middle East Centre chose to mark the Holy Month of Ramadan by celebrating the gift of giving with a Suhoor dinner gathering in the presence of students, alumni, families and friends, and staff of the University, alongside the Centre's social responsibility partners. All the partners were able to present their distinctive contributions to the community and guests were invited to join and support their efforts through the University partnerships, or directly. The Middle East Centre took the opportunity to highlight the latest regional social responsibility collaborations while tracing others back to 2021 when the Centre celebrated its 15th anniversary and launched its '15 for 15' campaign (15 social responsibility activities for the 15 years of the Centre's existence). The Centre's 2024 Ramadan initiatives were presented as a chance to donate and volunteer and specifically to support The Iftar Project with Beit Al-Khair Society; Eid clothing initiative for children in need with Emirates Red Crescent; Gaza in our Hearts with Dubai Cares; the Ramadan Mir project with Emirates Red Crescent; 200 Iftar meals distribution at the Jebel Ali labour camp; and a visit to Senses Residential and Day Care for Special Needs.

The audience heard about Make a Wish Foundation in Saudi Arabia for children with critical illness - it is run by CEO, Dr Tariq Alhogbani who is currently studying in the Manchester Global Executive MBA programme, The Sparkle Foundation's work to support and educate children in Malawi, Al Noor Training Centre for Persons with Disabilities, and Senses Residential and Day Care for Special Needs. In addition, 5 students from the Maria Conceicao Foundation, a foundation which extends crucial support to families and children in Bangladesh, shared their stories of how the foundation helped them. From the stage, the group shared their experiences and the impact the Foundation - and Maria personally - had made on their lives. Lastly, Rajesh Garg - Group CFO and Chief Sustainability Officer at the Landmark Group and The University of Manchester Middle East Centre's Alumnus presented how corporates can further sustainable practises.

Visits from senior leadership

Professor Dame Nancy Rothwell, Professor Fiona Devine, Nazir Afzal OBE, Professor Luke Georghiou

Professor Dame Nancy Rothwell the former President and Vice-Chancellor of the University of Manchester, visited UAE for the first time, leading a University team that focused on ongoing and potential future research and other collaborations with UAE institutions. The delegation included the University's leaders in international relations, strategic partnerships, and the CEO of Graphene@Manchester.

In Abu Dhabi, the delegation met with senior representatives from the Ministry of Education, Khalifa University, Mubadala and New York University. In Dubai, the team met the British University in Dubai (BUiD), Knowledge & Human Development Authority (KHDA), Dubai International Academic City, social responsibility partner - Dubai Cares, staff at the University's Centre and senior alumni. The delegation also visited UAE cultural destinations, participated in a social responsibility activity and joined staff, students and alumni at the Annual Gala Dinner. The University of Manchester is already collaborating with Khalifa University on the applications of graphene, the revolutionary advanced material first isolated in Manchester and which has the potential to deliver transformational technologies and help address some of the world's key challenges, from clean drinking water to supporting a circular 'green economy'. Academic and industry partnerships are critical to successful research, teaching and innovation, and the UAE is making a major impact through the graphene development work with Khalifa University and the Graphene Engineering Innovation Centre, supported by Masdar. The delegation met with Khalifa University's leadership committee and toured the Abu Dhabi campus.

Some of the UAE's most prominent landmarks and cultural destinations were on the itinerary of the visiting delegation from Manchester, led by Professor Dame Nancy Rothwell, President & Vice-Chancellor. These included the Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque in Abu Dhabi, The Museum of the Future, and Sheikh Mohammed Centre for Cultural Understanding (SMC-CU) in Dubai, where the delegation enjoyed orientation tours and briefings, together with University alumni. They were able to learn more about the UAE and the role of culture in promoting coexistence and tolerance, and explore various elements of Islamic art, culture, and architecture, Emirati history, traditions and cuisine – and the future.

The visiting group was hosted by Emirates Marine Environmental Group (EMEG) and joined an activity to plant young mangroves, giving everyone the chance to get their hands dirty. EMEG is an NGO working on marine wildlife conservation in the UAE with a mission to protect marine wildlife populations and advance research, education and conservation of UAE marine ecosystems. Mangroves grow in saltwater and are an important part of the UAE's ecosystem, protecting coastlines and coral reefs from erosion, providing a breeding ground for various fish species, and aid in removing carbon dioxide from the earth's atmosphere.



The Annual Student and Alumni Dinner 2022 adopted the theme of 'making an impact' and was the first face to face gala since 2019. Professor Dame Nancy Rothwell, President and Vice-Chancellor, was guest of honour and highlighted the valuable role played by students and alumni in the region, as part of the University family. Guests were able to enjoy speakers including James Baker, CEO of Graphene@Manchester, Rob Willock, Director of The Economist Corporate Network in Dubai, and Elie Habib, Co-Founder and CTO of Anghami. Other highlights of the evening included a series of 'I AM IMPACTFUL' video messages from students and alumni, and the announcement of the fundraising success for the Dubai Cares' Adopt a School programme.







The Manchester delegation visited the Middle East Centre to meet staff and commemorate the 15th anniversary of the Centre. Dame Nancy Rothwell unveiled and signed a 3D plaque of the University crest and congratulated Middle East Director Randa Bessiso and her team on their success in growing and supporting a vibrant regional community of students and alumni. Dame Nancy Rothwell said: "Personal contact is so important and I have been enormously impressed by the warmth and openness of the people in the UAE and interest in our University. We found strong mutual interests in addressing the world's major challenges. 


Bicentenary celebration at the Middle East Centre
